Commissioner Clemmer was absent. There were 18 Commissioners, 1 absent, and 1 vacant seat.

PUBLIC HEARING

- Mayor Crum announced the Proclamation for Domestic Violence Awareness Month.
- Mayor Crum asked for nominations and approval for Chairman of the County Legislative Body. A motion was made by Commissioner Quillen and seconded by Commissioner Waddle to nominate Mayor David Crum as continuing Chairman of the County Legislative Body. Mayor Crum asked for the Commissioners to vote by acclaimation, Mayor Crum asked all those in favor to say I, and all those oppose like sign. Mayor Crum will remain the Chairman of the County Legislative Body.
- Mayor Crum asked for nominations and approval for Chairman-Pro-Tem of Legislative Body. Commissioner McAmis asked for Chairman-Pro-Tem to be passed on to someone else. A motion was made by Commissioner Tucker and seconded by Commissioner Patterson to appoint Commissioner White as the Chairman-Pro-Tem of the Legislative Body. Mayor Crum asked for the Commissioners to vote by acclaimation. Mayor Crum asked for those in favor to say I, and all those oppose like sign. Commissioners voted to appoint Commissioner White as the Chairman-Pro-Tem.

They have asked for Greene County to assist. TDEC will be contracting for the tire removal. Chairman Street called the board meeting to order.

Minutes were tabled due to this being a called meeting.

New Business was then discussed.

I. Introduction of Potential EMS Director Conrad "Chuck" Kearns

Mayor Crum stated that many applications had been received. He stated that Mr. Kearns had applied for the interim position as well as the full time EMS director position. Mayor Crum explained that CTAS had reviewed all the resumes and sent them back in the order of their recommendation which was based upon each candidate's history, work experience, education, etc. Mayor Crum stated that there were some interviews conducted of the best applicants either by Skype or in person. Mayor Crum stated that his secretary Kim called and did reference checks on the top three candidates. Mayor Crum stated that Mr. Kearns is the president of the National Association of EMTs. Mayor Crum stated that he wanted an opportunity for the board to meet with Mr. Kearns and ask questions as well as an opportunity for the community and EMS employees to meet with him.

Mr. Kearns stated that he had attended the county commission meeting in July after meeting with Mayor Crum. He stated that his family was interested in

living in this area. He stated that during his career he has worked with both large and small EMS systems, both at a state and county level.

Mayor Crum stated that Mr. Kearns is interested in developing a local mobile paramedic medicine system which would work with the area hospitals in following up with patients after hospital discharges. This would be a way of avoiding readmissions to hospitals thus saving the area hospitals from Medicare withholdings. Mr. Kearns used the example that a paramedic would check on a patient and report back to the physician. This prevents a patient from having to return to the emergency room. In turn, the hospitals saved money on Medicare withholdings and offered to pay the ambulance service a set fee for each assessment. Mr. Kearns stated that this concept has also been used for necessary school physicals.

Chairman Street asked Mr. Kearns to elaborate on the challenges and opportunities he would face as the EMS Director. Mr. Kearns stated that he had review the CTAS report and saw opportunities for improvement. He noted the poor morale among employees. He hopes to get everyone on board and have many employees involved in some of the decision making. He stated he felt that employees don't necessary hate change; they just need to be involved. He stated that he would form many committees to get the employees engaged. He hopes to see that all of the county commissioners would be willing to be involved with helping the employees as well. He also looked forward to analyzing the local EMS data, working with other departments such as law enforcement, and working on a SWAT paramedic team.

Alderman Webster stated that she was impressed with Kearn's background. Mr. Kearns stated that he enjoys humor in the work place. He stated that he is safety advocate for EMS employees. EMA Director Brown stated that EMS had fell by the wayside in regards to the hazmat team and that he would like to see that corrected. Mr. Kearns stated that he would want hazmat certified employees on each shift. Commissioner Jennings stated that he was thoroughly impressed and that he looked forward to working with Mr. Kearns. Mr. Kearns stated that he likes to follow the Golden Rule with work ethic by treating people with respect.

Hospital Administrator Whitfield inquired if Mr. Kearns had had an opportunity to overlook the EMS budget. Mr. Kearns noted the quarter of a million dollar increase in the expense budget in the last 2 years. He stated that he will be taking his time in examining the budget and will be looking for efficiencies. He stated he would also be overlooking the electronic patient care reports as well as examining the billing staff's knowledge and training. He would ensure that all the EMS calls that can be billed were being billed such as dead on arrival calls. He stated that he would also look at EMS's equipment and competitively purchase

equipment as needed. Kearns also will see if Greene County qualifies for different grants.

Mayor Daniels stated that he was impressed by Mr. Kearns. Mayor Daniels then made a motion to offer Mr. Kearns the position of Greene County EMS Director. The motion was seconded by Mayor Crum. Mayor Crum added that Mr. Kearns has a travel trailer that he would be staying in temporarily while he moves his family down here. Mayor Crum asked the board to allow Mr. Kearns to use electricity from an EMS substation since there is no relocation allowance. The board approved the motion unanimously.

Mr. Kearns thanked the board for the opportunity to serve Greene County. He stated that he will be traveling back and forth to Ohio because he has four young children and will be also selling his house.

II. Other Business

The board welcomed Takoma Hospital Dennis Kiley to the board.

Minor Subdivisions. The Planning Commission was provided with a list of minor subdivisions that had received administrative approval.



Proposed Changes to the Zoning Resolution concerning Board of Zoning Appeals

Regulations

The Greene County Board of Zoning Appeals recently approved by-laws intended to 1.) provide guidance for staff and Board members about processes under the Board's authority; 2.) provide information to citizens about Board procedures to ensure equal and consistent treatment of requests; and 3.) change the wording of the requirements in state law that were difficult to understand.

Adoption of the by-laws resulted in a need to revise Section 10 of the Greene County Zoning Resolution concerning the BZA. On June 24, 2015, the Board reviewed and recommended specific changes to the Resolution, a copy of which is attached. This particular version shows existing wording that is proposed to be deleted in red type and "struck thru", while proposed additions are shown underlined and in blue type. The actual resolution without the changes is also attached.

As with any proposed change to the Zoning Resolution the Planning Commission must consider and recommend the changes to the County Legislative Body.

ARTICLE X BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS

established in accordance with §13-7-106, Tennessee Code Annotated. Such Board of Zoning Appeals shall consist of five regular members appointed by the Greene County Legislative Body Hourd of Commissioners to serve terms of one, two, three, four, and five years respectively, thereafter, terms to be for five years and vacancies filled for the unexpired term only. A RESOLUTION FOR AMENDING ARTICLE X. OF THE GREENE COUNTY ZONING RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE GREENE COUNTY BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS

WHEREAS, the Greene County Legislative Body has adopted a zoning resolution that provides for the establishment and operation of the Greene County Board of Zoning Appeals; and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Board of Zoning Appeals, on June 24, 2015, approved bylaws to guide their operation; and

WHEREAS, approval of these by-laws necessitated changes to Article X. <u>Board of Zoning Appeals</u> of the Greene County Zoning Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Zoning Appeals developed and recommended such changes to the Greene County Regional Planning Commission, for their consideration and further recommendation to the Greene County Legislative Body; and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Legislative Body realizes that zoning regulations must be changed from time to time to provide for the continued efficient operation of county organizations; and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Regional Planning Commission did study this proposal on the 8th day of September, 2015 and recommended that the Greene County Legislative Body amend the zoning resolution; and

WHEREAS, Public Notice requirements pursuant to T.C.A. §13-7-105(b)(1) have been met;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Greene County Legislative Body, meeting in regular session on the 19th day of October, 2015, a quorum being present and a majority of the full County Legislative Body membership voting affirmatively to amend the Greene County Zoning Resolution as follows:

Amend Article X Board of Zoning Appeals to add the following:

ARTICLE X BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS

1001. Creation and Appointment. The Greene County Board of Zoning Appeals is hereby established in accordance with §13-7-106, Tennessee Code Annotated. Such Board of Zoning Appeals shall be appointed by the Greene County Legislative Body to serve terms of one, two, three, four, and five years respectively, thereafter, terms to be for five years and vacancies filled for the unexpired term only. The Board shall consist of seven members; five (5) regular, or voting members, and two (2) associate, or non-voting members. The county commission shall have power to remove any member of the board for cause, after public hearing.

1002. Rules of Procedure and Jurisdiction of Board.

1002.1 The Board may adopt supplemental rules of procedure, not inconsistent with T.C.A. §13-7-107. The supplemental rules, or by-laws, may address, but shall not be limited to, the following: maintenance of a record of the board's resolutions, transactions, motions and actions, which shall be a public record; election from its membership of a chair and other officers as the board deems necessary; and the inclusion of statements of reasons for the board's actions as part of each motion or action, including such findings of fact and statements of material evidence as the board my deem pertinent.

1002.2 A schedule of regular monthly meeting dates and times shall be established by the bylaws of the Board. Meetings may also be called by the chairman or by a majority of the membership and at such other times as the board may determine. Such chairman, or in his absence the acting chairman, may administer oaths. All meetings of the board shall be open to the public. The board shall keep minutes of its proceedings, showing the vote of each member upon each question, or, if absent or failing to vote, indicating such fact; shall take all evidence necessary to justify or explain its action, and shall keep records of its examinations and of other official action, all of which shall be immediately filed in the office of the board and shall be a public record.

1003. Appeals: How Taken. Anyone may appeal a decision of the zoning administrator that has been based, in part or in whole, on the zoning resolution or other regulations developed as per T.C.A. §13-7-107 and §13-7-109, including individuals, firms or corporations, any governmental office, department, board or bureau, or anyone else aggrieved by the decision. Such appeal shall be taken within a reasonable time, as provided by the rules of the board, specifying the grounds thereof. The building commissioner shall transmit forthwith to the board all papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed was taken. The board shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of the appeal, give public notice thereof, as well as due notice to the parties in interest, and decide the same within reasonable time. Upon hearing, any party may appear in person or by agent or attorney.

1004. Powers. The Board of Zoning Appeals shall have the following powers:

- 1004.1 Appeals. The board shall hear and decide appeals where the appellant charges that there is an error in any order, requirement, decision or refusal made by the building commissioner or any other administrative official in carrying out or enforcing the zoning resolution or any ordinance enacted pursuant to T.C.A. §13-7-109. The board shall also interpret the zoning maps and determine disputed questions of lot lines or district boundary lines or similar questions as they arise in the administration of the zoning resolution as per T.C.A. §13-7-107.
- 1004.2 Special Exceptions and Special Questions. The board shall hear and decide requests for special exceptions as permitted in the zoning resolution. The board shall also hear and decide requests for interpretation of the zoning resolution and shall make decisions upon other special questions as authorized by any resolution or ordinance, as per T.C.A. §13-7-107

1004.3 Variance Requests. The board shall hear and decide variance requests:

- 1004.3.1 For lots of record at the time of adoption of the zoning resolution, that are exceptionally narrow, shallow or shaped in such a way that the strict application of the regulations would create exceptional practical difficulties to or exceptional and undue hardship upon the owner of such property; or
- 1004.3.2 For any lot or tract which has exceptional topographical conditions or other extraordinary or exceptional situations or conditions that would result in exceptional practical difficulties to or exceptional and undue hardship upon the owner of such property; and
- 1004.3.3 When relief may be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without substantially impairing the intent and purpose of the zoning resolution; and
- 1004.3.4 And may attach conditions regarding the location, character and other features of the proposed building structure or use as it may deem advisable in furtherance of the purpose of this resolution; and
- 1004.3.5 Provided that before any variance is granted it shall be shown that special circumstances are attached to the property which do not generally apply to other property in the neighborhood.
- 1004.4 Action of the Board of Zoning Appeals. In exercising the aforementioned powers, the Board of Zoning Appeals may, in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or may modify the order, requirements, decision or determination appealed from, and to that end shall have all powers of the building commissioner. The concurring vote of a majority of the board shall be necessary to reverse any order, requirement, decision or determination of any such administrative official or to decide in favor of the applicant on any matter upon which it is required to pass under this resolution, or to authorize any variance from the terms of this resolution.



A. A RESOLUTION TO REQUEST THE STATE OF TENNESSEE THROUGH LEGISLATIVE AND LEGAL ACTION TO REAFFIRM THE STATE OF TENNESSEE'S AUTHORITY TO REGULATE DOMESTIC RELATIONS INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE TRADITIONAL CONCEPT OF MARRIAGE AS BETWEEN ONE MAN AND ONE WOMAN

A motion was made by Commissioner Jennings and seconded by Commissioner Kesterson to approve a resolution to request the State of Tennessee through legislative and legal action to reaffirm the State of Tennessee's authority to regulate domestic relations including but not limited to the traditional concept of marriage as between one man and one woman.

Commissioner Cobble called on County Attorney Roger Woolsey, who helped draft the resolution, to explain the proposal and read Article X1, Section 18 of the Tennessee Constitution.

County Attorney, Roger Woolsey, stated that a 2006 statewide referendum amended the Tennessee Constitution to say that marriage in Tennessee is to be defined as between one man and one woman. The proposed amendment was approved by 81.6 percent of those voting in the referendum statewide. Following the referendum, an amendment, which is now Article X1, Section Section 18 was added to the State Constitution, in which the County Attorney read at the Commission Meeting.

Tennessee Constitution

Article X1, Secion 18

"The historical institution and legal contract solemnizing the relationship of one man and one woman shall be the only legally recognized marital contract in this state. Any policy or law or judicial interpretation, purporting to define marriage as anything other than the historical institution and legal contract between one man and one woman is contrary to the public policy of this state or foreign jurisdiction issues a license for persons to marry and if such marriage is prohited in this state by the provisions of this section, then the marriage shall be void and unenforceable in this state."

On June 26, the U.S. Supreme Court issued a controversial 5-4 ruling legalizing same-sex marriage in all states. Woolsey stated that the U.S. Supreme Court majority decision ruled that the state constitution's definition of marriage was unconstitutional in terms of the U.S. Constitution, and was a violation of the U.S. Constitution's guarantee of equal protection under the law for all citizens, as expressed in the 14th Amendment of the Constitution.

County Attorney explained that the resolution calls on state Senator Steve Southerland, State Representative David Hawk, State Representative Jeremy Faison to take action to defend Tennessee's right to define marriage.

The resolution asks these lawamakers to support legislation that would allow the state to decide how it wishes to define marriage and recognize that marriage is a state issue rather than a federal one. The resolution also seeks action from the Tennessee Attorney General, requesting that the office take steps to challenge the Supreme Court's decision. The resolution directs the Greene County Clerk to forward copies of the resolution to county governments throughout the state.

County Attorney said that the resolution does not direct Greene County Clerk
Lori Bryant not to issue marriage license to same-sex couples. Roger Woolsey said,
"I'm not the one to say to Lori that she needs to be the one who defies the Supreme
Court decision, adding that he would advise the County Clerk to follow he state's
directive until such a time as it is legally allowable not to issue marriage licenses.

Mayor Crum called on the Commissioners to vote on their keypads. The following was taken: Commissioners Carpenters, Cobble, Hensley, Jennings, Kesterson, McAmis, Miller, Neas, Parton, Patterson, Peters, Randolph, Shelton, Tucker, Waddell, Waddle, and White voted yes. Commissioner Collins and Quillen Voted no. The vote was 17 – aye; and 2 – nay; 1 – absent and 1 – vacant. Commissioners voted in favor of the motion to approve the resolution.

A RESOLUTION TO REQUEST THE STATE OF TENNESSEE THROUGH LEGISLATIVE AND LEGAL ACTION TO REAFFIRM THE STATE OF TENNESSEE'S AUTHORITY TO REGULATE DOMESTIC RELATIONS INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE TRADITIONAL CONCEPT OF MARRIAGE AS BETWEEN ONE MAN AND ONE WOMAN

WHEREAS, the individual states in the United States since this country's founding have regulated and defined marriage without interference from the federal government or its courts; and

WHEREAS, the State of Tennessee and most other states pursuant to the inherent rights of the individual states and its people continue to define marriage as the legal obligations, rights and responsibilities associated with the marital union between one man and one woman; and

WHEREAS, in 2006 the citizens of the State of Tennessee by legislatively referred popular vote determined that a legal marriage/union in the State of Tennessee is to be recognized only if said marriage is between one man and one woman which amendment was ratified and is now Section 18 to Article XI of the Tennessee State Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court in the case of United States v. Windsor, recognized the State's authority "to regulate the subject of domestic relations with respect to the protection of offspring, property interest, and the enforcement of marital responsibilities"; and

WHEREAS, further the United States Supreme Court in the United States vs. Windsor declined to intervene, decide or determine whether the right to marry by same sex participants was a legal right protected by the United States Constitution and in fact the United States Supreme Court in the majority opinion written by Justice Kennedy, affirmed that "the definition of marriage is the foundation of the State's broader authority to

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regulate the subject of domestic relations with respect to the protection of offspring, property interest, and the enforcement of marital responsibilities"; in effect the Supreme Court reserved for the states that determination of whether to recognize and/or legalize same sex marriages in the same fashion as the traditional marriage between one man and one woman; and

WHEREAS, both the General Assembly as well as the State Attorney General evidently believed that the State of Tennessee's Constitutional Amendment which in effect bans same sex marriage was constitutional and fully enforceable in the State of Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, in June 2015 the Supreme Court of the United States (in a five to four decision) in the case of "Obergefell, et al vs. Hodges," has now determined that any legislation, law, or voter approved constitutional amendment in any state in the United States prohibiting same sex marriages is unconstitutional under the fourteenth amendment; in effect legislating for the individual states and its citizens the legality of same sex marriage with the corresponding responsibilities, rights and obligations; and

WHEREAS, it appears that it would be prudent, wise and necessary for the State of Tennessee to challenge the right of the United States Supreme Court to "make laws" that infringe upon the individual rights of the states and its citizens to govern and to legislate on those issues that are properly reserved by the individual states; and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Legislative Body by this Resolution is requesting that those State Legislators representing Greene County, Senator Steve Southerland, Representative Jeremy Faison and Representative David Hawk, be proactive and introduce legislation to defend the right of the State of Tennessee to determine the validity and

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sanctity of marriage in the State of Tennessee and to recognize the State of Tennessee's right to define marriage as a union between one man and one woman; to introduce legislation to allow County Court Clerks to honor their oath of office and refuse to issue marriage licenses to "same sex" couples and further to utilize the resources of the State of Tennessee to challenge the unconstitutional decision rendered by the Supreme Court in Obergefell et al. v. Hodges.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislative Body of Greene County, Tennessee meeting in regular session on the 21st day of September, 2015 a quorum being present and a majority voting in the affirmative:

- 1. That a request be forwarded to Senator Steve Southerland,
 Representative Jeremy Faison and Representative David Hawk
 asking our legislators to introduce legislation and take such other
 action as is necessary to support the mandates under our State
 Constitution and the Constitutional Amendment as well as the
 opinion of our citizens defining marriage as a union between one
 man and one woman.
- 2. To request that our State Attorney General acting on behalf of the citizens of Greene County and the citizens of the State of Tennessee take such legal action as is necessary to further challenge the authority of the United States Supreme Court to legislate and dictate to and take away from the basic rights of the State of Tennessee and its citizens to determine that a marriage is a union between one man and one woman and to continue the long standing tradition of the Volunteer State in taking a stand against laws, acts or decisions that violate the conscience of man.

A motion was made by Commissioner Tucker and seconded by Commissioner Waddle to approve a resolution in support of the application by the Greene County Partnership to the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development under the Fasttrack Economic Development Grant Program for \$300,000 to assist Worthington Industries with the expansion of their manufacturing facility.

Matt Steele and Travis Mays, representatives from Worthington Industries, explained to the Commissioners concerning the needed expansion of the manufacturing facility and the need for the support from the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development under the Fasttrack Economic Development Grant program.

Mayor Crum called the Commissioners to vote on their keypads. The following vote was taken: Commissioners Carpenter, Cobble, Collins, Hensley, Jennings, Kesterson, McAmis, Miller, Neas, Parton, Patterson, Peters, Quillen, Randolph, Shelton, Tucker, Waddell, Waddle, and White voted yes. Commissioner Clemmer was absent. The vote was 19 - aye; 0 - nay; 1 - absent; and 1 - vacant. The Commissioners voted in the favor of the motion to approve the resolution.

PRESENT: Dr. Vicki Kirk, chairman; Dr. Linda Stroud, Jerry Ayers, Mark Norman, Tom Ferguson, Susanne Cox, Jerry Patton, Todd Smith, W.T. Daniels, Teresa Reaves, Drucilla Miller, Cal Doty, David Crum, Brian Wilhoit, Jason Cobble and Rebeckah Ball

Dr. Vicki Kirk opened the meeting by welcoming everyone and going over the mission and vision statements of the Education and Workforce Development Department. Members of the committee suggested some additions, and Dr. Kirk agreed to send Education & Workforce Development Director Rebeckah Ball revised mission and vision statements to email to the members.

Jerry Ayers reported on NationJob which was discussed at the most recent Manufacturers' Council meeting. NationJob is a community-based job search website which requires a \$20,000 commitment from local manufacturers to get started. A couple of local manufacturers have already committed, according to Tom Ferguson.

Mrs. Ball distributed copies of the Wage & Benefit Survey and explained its benefits for area manufacturers.

Mr. Ayers stated that the community was not awarded the LEAP Grant but there are hopes of receiving some other monies that will become available.

Cal Doty discussed the importance of subcommittees and gave the names of the members that were appointed to the Marketing and Relationship Between Education & Industry Subcommittees. According to Mr. Doty, these subcommittees will meet in the interim between EWD meetings with progress reports given at EWD meetings. Mr. Doty agreed to send a memo to all members of the subcommittees.

Dr. Kirk mentioned working together to make some changes at the high school level to assist students in becoming more connected to careers. Manufacturers could possibly come into the schools during skinny periods, she said, to help students understand careers in this area.

David Crum stated that job shadowing needs to be done with purpose. He also said that successful mentors are needed to help students become more focused.

Dr. Kirk presented a Tennessee Council for Career & Technical Education article to the committee and advised everyone to visit the website.

She spoke about The Academies of Nashville Spring Study Visit and all the activities for individuals. For example: traveling to schools, sitting in on roundtable discussions and planning sessions, as well as participating in discussions on what other counties are doing. She said this would be a great experience for members of the committee to see the efforts that are working to get students prepared for careers and the workforce. The study visits are done quarterly, she said.

Todd Smith reported on a Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities (CEO) meeting held in Gray, Tenn., which focused on students creating and starting up their own businesses. He said there was a \$25,000 startup cost for the program which is usually donated by area businesses and industries.

Mark Norman spoke about Work Based Learning (WBL). He said WBL experiences are those that offer students the opportunities to explore career options and develop critical skills in collaboration with community and/or industry involvement. WBL activities help students develop a broad understanding and awareness of industries and possible careers that are available to them, he said, and added that the Greene County School System will be hiring a WBL coordinator in the near future.

Mr. Ayers showed a Power Point presentation on Advanced Manufacturing Institute and discussed the program.

Mr. Ayers and Dr. Kirk discussed the AIMS Scholars Program.

Dr. Kirk stated that there were conflicts with the present meeting dates for the committee. It was agreed to set the date and time prior to the meetings every other month.

The meeting was adjourned.

Establishing Partnerships between the Business Community and Rural Schools.

An effective way to help develop a strong rural educational program is to establish a business partnership between the rural school and the business community. Once this relationship is in place, the advantages for both the schools and business community can prove beneficial to the entire rural community. For a partnership between a business and a school to be effective, each party must be willing to define its specific needs and demonstrate a desire to make the partnership work.

WHAT IS A SCHOOL-BUSINESS PARTNERSHIP?

Generally defined, a partnership is a mutual agreement between a business and a school to establish certain goals, and to construct a reasonable means of achieving those goals. The term "school-business partnership" is distinguished from the "adopt a school" concept by the fact that a true school-business partnership is not an inner-city program geared toward helping only disadvantaged students. The present focus of school-business partnerships is on improving the overall educational system and perhaps aiding in community development as well.

WHAT KINDS OF PARTNERSHIPS EXIST?

The types of partnerships that are formed between a school and a business depend on what each party hopes to achieve. The objectives of each party will determine whether the type of partnership will be directly involved in the overall school program or whether it will be indirectly involved, or involved in just a specific area of the school program. Some school-business partnerships are only partnerships in the sense that both parties wish the relationship be as uncomplicated as possible. In this kind of partnership the business might provide funds and equipment for the school program while the school might reciprocate by publicly giving credit to the business. Another type of partnership, the long-term partnership, is usually more complex in nature. Long-term partnerships usually have well-defined purposes, and both parties work closely together to accomplish their objectives. These partnerships often provide programs to help enrich school programs, such as sending professional business people to teach mini-courses. Long-term partnerships are frequently concerned with developing enriching career education programs and providing on-the-job training.

HOW CAN PARTNERSHIPS BE EFFECTIVE FOR THE RURAL SCHOOL?

Along with today's emphasis on effective education comes the constant pressure of budget cutbacks of public education funds. Forming a strong school-business partnership can help ease some of the budget woes, permit the business community to take responsibility for the quality of education, and make the transition from school to work easier. Rural schools frequently do not have the monies for new equipment or innovative teaching projects. Partnerships can help supply funds and professional expertise for hands-on projects or pilot programs which the rural school budget may not be able to cover but which the school wants to incorporate into its curriculum. An example of this might be an agreement between a local bank

and a school to stimulate life skill activities as motivating factors to achieving learning objectives. Often businesses can provide workshops for students and staff, provide upto-date equipment, or provide direct on-the-job training. Many partnerships are formed because both the rural school and business community find themselves concerned about the lack of rural career enrichment programs. With budget cuts and the increased attention being given to the back-to-basics movement, schools are finding that they have to decide whether they can afford to include arts and humanities in their curriculum. Rural educators who are concerned about the importance of arts and humanities to students' overall educational and cultural growth should look toward possible partnerships to fulfill this need.

Arts and humanities programs frequently discover a need to bring in outside instructional resources. Again, partnerships can fill that void by functioning as a liaison for the school and a cultural center, for example. With the support of a partnership, schools can encourage teachers to work closely with cultural centers to stimulate student creativity.

HOW CAN BUSINESS BENEFIT FROM THE SCHOOL-BUSINESS PARTNERSHIP?

A good partnership may prove to be invaluable to both the rural school and the business community. By cooperating with the rural schools in developing strong career and educational programs, the rural business community may not have to depend on outside skilled help. Large businesses which form partnerships with rural schools are assuring their own future with the knowledge that the future work force may be the finished product of their involvement in quality education.

WHY ARE PARTNERSHIPS FORMED?

- --Mutual desire to improve the quality of education. Rural schools are usually too small to offer a large variety of educational services. Too often, enriching activities such as field trips and special workshops are not available to rural schools. The reasons for this vary--lack of funding, lack of facilities, or simply a lack of qualified staff. In order to give rural school students the same opportunities for quality education which are available to many urban schools, outside resources should be considered. A good partnership can bring in a wide range of fields and professionals to satisfy the need and contribute to the broadening of rural students' social and career perspectives.
- --A need to uplift the morale of the educational system and the rural community regarding education. While the back-to-basics movement itself may not be a hard subject to deal with, recent criticism of public education has, to some extent, taken its toll on school and community morale. The business community can play a vital role in uplifting the morale of both the educational system and the community by being involved in the whole schoolprogram. Partnerships can function as a liaison in the improvement of community-school programs.
- --The school's need for financial funding. Rural schools with a budget that usually just covers the bare necessities can benefit from the formation of a good partnership. Outdated school equipment can be replaced with modern equipment with monies from partnerships. Buildings, renovations, and computers are just a few extras that business partnerships can provide.

HOW CAN PARTNERSHIPS BE FORMED?

A partnership can be initiated by either a school or a business. To form a partnership, communication must be established. Each party should be willing to take time to sit down and draw up a definite set of goals. The parties involved must be committed to the time and effort it takes to make a good partnership. Individuals selected from each side should be comfortable working outside their environment and relate well to people. Business-school partnerships can be extremely rewarding--but to work, they need total commitment from both parties.

What Schools Can Do For Their Partners.....

- Put your partner on your mailing list...communicate
- Provide visibility by submitting partnership information to be used in press releases, human interest articles and school publicity
- Always remember to thank your partner...notes from students are particularly effective
- Provide space in the school to highlight partnership activities
- Obtain birthdays of employees and have children send birthday cards
- Send baked goods to partner's place of business for special occasions
- Provide choral or musical groups for special occasions
- Invite your partner to shadow a teacher or administrator
- Initiate a student Partners club or have the Student Council assist with planning partnership activities
- Sponsor a "Battle of Partners" contest...softball games, races, etc.
- Provide art work for display
- Establish one liaison at the school to channel all ideas and coordinate activities
- Initiate a logo contest to design a logo for partnership activities
- Invite your partner to serve on advisory committees, task forces, etc.
- Provide referral of prospective employees to the business
- Share monthly activity calendars with your partner
- Provide decorations for partner functions, meetings, i.e. centerpieces, signs, etc.
- Provide your partner with an inside look at school, tour the school and explain curriculum
- If applicable, have students submit designs that will be chosen by the partner for holiday cards or publications
- Invite your partner to breakfast or coffee with the principal or a teacher and a tour of a few classes
- Give an update on partnership activities at PTA/PTSA meetings
- Invite your partner to participate in community projects with your schools, i.e., baskets at Thanksgiving
- Establish a referral system with your partner for part-time employment
- Share school and student successes with partners, particularly where the partner has been involved



What Partners Can Do For Schools.....

- Provide release time for employees to tutor students
- Recognize students who have made improvement in academic achievement, attendance, or behavior
- Recognize students who enroll in honors or advanced placement classes
- Provide incentives to identified potential dropouts to encourage their graduation from school
- Adopt an Academic Scholar Program
- Sponsor an art contest
- Provide shadowing opportunities for students, teachers, and administrators
- Provide seminars for students, faculty, or parents
- Provide curriculum support materials
- Serve as judges for various competitive events
- Donate used equipment or materials to schools
- Sponsor educational field trips
- Donate tickets to cultural or other appropriate events
- Provide incentive awards
- Provide display space for student work or notices of school events
- Provide an award for Teacher of the Year or any outstanding teacher
- Provide opportunities for students to serve as "Boss for a Day"
- Co-Sponsor joint beautification projects
- Serve as guest speakers and participate in career days
- Offer seminars on employability skills
- Provide part-time, summer, or post-graduation employment
- Provide space in business publications to highlight partnership activities
- Host meetings for the school
- Provide tours of your facility
- Purchase an ad in the school's publication(s)
- Support substance abuse education program
- Sponsor reading incentive programs
- Provide support for Math, Science, Computer Education and Technology
