GREENE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 2020 6:00 P.M.

The Greene Legislative Body was in regular session on Tuesday, February 18, 2020 at 6:00 P.M. in the Greene County Courthouse.

Mayor Morrison called the meeting to order to transact business that has lawfully come before the Honorable Body. Commissioner Dale Tucker gave the Invocation.

Commissioner George Clemmer led the Pledge to the Flag.

Mayor Morrison called the Commissioners to sign in on their keypads and the following Commissioners were present. Commissioners Bible, Bowers, Bryant, Burkey, Carpenter, Clemmer, Cobble, Crawford, Dabbs, Kesterson, Lawing, Parton, Patterson, Peters, Powell, Quillen, Shelton, Tucker, Waddle, and White were present. Commissioner Arrowood was absent. There were 20 Commissioners present.

Mayor Morrison expressed his apologies during the Public Hearing last month in regards to the presentation given by Gypsy Tweed in the Animal Welfare, which should have been categorized under Other Business.

Mayor Morrison stated that we would be observing a strict 3 minutes Public Speaking time limit. If the speaker wishes to address the Commission further, we will stop the speaker, and at that time, you may recognized that speaker for additional 3 minutes, for a total of 6 minutes.

PUBLIC HEARING

Joel Hausser explained to the Commissioners that Rural Resources is a non-profit Farm-to-Table entity in Greene County. He said that the various opportunities that the institution provides is partnering with the Second Harvest Food Bank, Farm Day education camps for kids, providing canning nutrition classes to the economic insufficient residents, gardening classes, farm mentoring programs, and the teen gardening, cooking, and business skills program. He explained that Rural Resources exists from grants and donations.

Commissioner Bowers called on Art Gillen to speak in regards to the resolution proposing that Greene County would not allow refugees to be settled in Greene County. He read a letter that he received from Erin Hensley Schultz in regards to the statements made by both Commissioners and by community members in regards to the resolution concerning refugees. (A copy of the Erin Hensley Schultz's letter read by Art Gillen is included in the minutes).

Commissioner Quillen called on Jim Banderas to speak to the Commissioners in regards to the Community Event Co-hosted by Rally for the Valley & Indivisible Greene County. He invited everyone to attend the Community Forum: How To Make Our Health Care Work, on February 27, 2020, 6 PM-8:30 PM at the Capitol Theatre 104 S. Main Street, Greeneville, TN 37743. Greene County Residents and our elected officials are gathering to discuss the state of our health care. Ballad Health was issued a COPA and the merger of Mountain States Health Alliance & Wellmont Health System is complete. Now is the time to see how best to make it work in a way that gives the citizens a voice, ensures accountability, and protects our health care services, our health care workers and our hospitals, hopefully for years to come.

Commissioner Quillen called on Dr. Philip Thwing to speak to the Commissioners in regards to the spay and neuter resolution that he would like to see on next month's agenda. He said, he and his wife had become interested in animal rescue when they lived in the River Plantation. The summary of the resolution will be that all adult dogs and cats will be spayed or neutered unless the owner obtains an annual permit to keep the animal intact.

Commissioner Cobble called on Buffy Seaton to speak to the Commissioners concerning the postings on social media account of Lena Kendrick Dean, a Greene County Election Commissioner, and a member of Indivisible Greene County. Buffy Seaton gave a hand-out to each Commissioner in regards to the social media of Lena Kendrick Dean. She read the exhibits from the hand-out to the Commissioners. She stated that, Lena Kenderick Dean is a leader of Indivisible of Greene County, which is a local chapter of his radical hate group, whose sole propose, as stated on the very front of their website, is to defeat Trump in any means possible." "Do your think she can be trusted to be on the Election Commissioner and secure the ballots?" "We in Greene County do not think so." "This is a matter that we the citizens are taking very serious." "How can we trust that our vote will count, when a commissioner has an oath to bring down President Trump by any means necessary." She stated, "We the citizens of Greene Countywill not accept a "talking to" we want her dismissed." Commissioner Lawing called on Doran Kilday to speak to the Commissioners in regards to a comment that was made by a Greene County Commissioner. Doran Kilday stated, "A couple of Commission Meeting ago, a Greene County Commissioner came into the Courtroom and spoke to a group of women, and he made a comment," "I wish I had my gun, I want to shoot someone." He said, "Last Commission meeting he asked Brad Peters, Do you have your gun."

He stated, "Brad Peters said "You be careful going home." Doran Kilday stated, "I take that as a threat." He said to the Greene County Sheriff, Wesley Holt, "If something happens to

me Brad Peters is your guy.

Commissioner Brad Peters explained that the ladies that he was talking to was his wife and step-daughter, when he came into the Commission meeting. He said his wife ask him, "Where were you?" Brad Peters said he told her, "If I would had a gun, I would have probably shot somebody, and that it was not directed to anyone in this room.

Art Gillen - Recognized by Hoot Bowens

February 18, 2020

To our Greene County Commissioners:

At last month's County Commission meeting, our commissioners voted on a resolution proposing that Greene County would not allow refugees to be resettled in Greene County. This resolution was voted down, but the discussion that occurred before the vote brought an issue to light that needs to be addressed: are we holding ourselves and each other accountable?

Statements were made by both commissioners and by community members that I discovered, in the weeks after the meeting, to be untrue. For example, the town of Dearborn, Michigan was brought up more than once as an example of "what happens when an American town is overrun by refugees." Claims were made about the town being run by Sharia law, and about citizens being unable to walk safely down the streets in Dearborn. I was horrified by this news, as anyone would be, so after the meeting, I went home and looked for more information about Dearborn. I'm a worrier, so if there is something I need to be worrying about, I want to know everything I can possibly know about it.

As much as I tried to find the specific instances that were used to bolster the argument that we must not allow refugees to resettle in Greene County, I couldn't. What I did find, after reading newspaper articles from as far back as 2009, and comparing statistics for Dearborn to other towns of a comparable size and economic standing, and calling the Dearborn Chamber of Commerce, and emailing the Dearborn police department, is that the reports of "Sharia law" in Dearborn are greatly exaggerated. Dearborn has a large Muslim and Arab American population, yes, and is the home of the Islamic Center of America, the largest mosque in North America. Apparently, the Shatila Bakery in Dearborn has "dangerous" desserts. But according to a 2019 report on WXYZ (abc7), Dearborn made the list of the 25 safest cities in Michigan. (Cross-checked full report on safehome.org.) Another interesting thing I discovered while looking for evidence of Sharia law in Dearborn is that in 2016 alone, refugees resettled in Southeast Michigan over the past decade generated between \$229.6 million and \$295.3 million in new spending, along with between 1,789 and 2,311 jobs. (GlobalDetroit.com) Does Dearborn have crime? Sure. Does it have significantly more crime than other cities of comparable size? No. Are the residents of Dearborn operating under Sharia Law? According to the Dearborn Police Department, no, they are not.

Here's the problem, though: if you WANT to find "proof" of Sharia Law overtaking Dearborn, MI, you can...sort of. You can easily find a photo from an anti-ISIS protest that was held by the Muslim community in Dearborn in December 2015. However, this photo was circulated later that same day with a caption claiming that it was a pro-ISIS rally. This photo, with this caption, is the one that circulated like wildfire on Facebook by people who didn't double-check to make sure it was true before getting really mad about it and repeating the lie. The true story, reported not only by several news sources, but also by the City of Dearborn's Public Information and police departments, is that hundreds of Arab Americans gathered outside the Karbala Islamic Center in Dearborn to take a stand against ISIS and terrorism. The truth is there, and freely available for anyone who is willing to do a Google reverse-image search.

The beauty of having a world of information at our fingertips is that we can find any information we're looking for. The other side of the coin is that not all of the information that is available is reliable. And while it can be difficult to tell factual news reporting from inaccurate, satire, or misleading journalism, it isn't impossible.

We ALL have a responsibility to check our sources, elected officials doubly so. If commissioners are making decisions for our community, then they need to be sure that they are making these decisions based on facts, not on rumors, doctored images, biased or unreliable news sources, or hearsay.

While listening to the commissioners make their arguments for or against the resolution, I heard several other pieces of misinformation used as evidence, especially regarding the process refugees go through before they are resettled in this country. I wouldn't have known this was misinformation if I hadn't been sitting next to a representative from the refugee resettlement office, who knew firsthand that the process was being represented incorrectly, but due to procedural rules, was unable to make the correction during the meeting.

What struck me, as I sat there listening to the discussion, was that they were about to vote on a vital community issue, and people were using statements that were factually inaccurate to support their arguments, and there was nothing we, the other people sitting in that room, could do about it.

What I would like to ask of our elected officials is that you hold yourselves and each other accountable. There are many tried-and-true methods to check the authenticity of a news report before you share it on social media or use it to support an argument in a county commission meeting. Biased news stories know no political affiliation, and both the left and the right need to be careful when accepting a story as truth. Whether we are in an elected position, or are sitting in the courtroom, listening and feeling powerless, we owe it to each other to speak the truth.

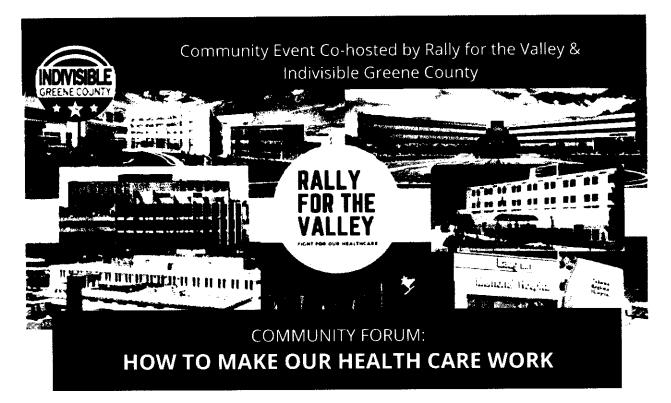
BREAKING NEWS CONSUMER'S HANDBOOK

FAKE NEWS EDITION

- 1. Big red flags for take news: ALL CAPS, or obviously photoshopped pics.
- 2. A glut of pop-ups and banner ads? Good sign the story is pure clickbait.
- 3. Check the domain! Fake sites often add ".co" to trusted brands to steal their luster. (Think: "abcnews.com.co")
- 4. If you land on an unknown site, check its "About" page. Then, Google it with the word "fake" and see what comes up.
- 5. If a story offers links, follow them. (Garbage leads to worse garbage.) No links, quotes, or references? Another telltale sign.
- 6. Verify an unlikely story by finding a reputable outlet reporting the same thing.
- 7. Check the date. Social media often resurrects outdated stories.
- 8. Read past headlines. Often they bear no resemblance to what lies beneath.
- 9. Photos may be misidentified and dated. Use a reverse image search engine like TinEye to see where an image *really* comes from.
- 10. Gut check. If a story makes you angry, it's probably designed that way.
- 11. Finally, if you're not sure it's true, don't share it! Don't. Share. It.

It is a reference to The Handmaid's Tale.

Hat tip to aggieric who posted this image in Sally Strange's diary about the 7-17-18 New York Daily News cover. That's where I saw it first, but it will be all over the internet before long.

Everyone who has seen even one episode of Handmaid's Tale would get it. The show is pretty popular, and a lot of people my age have even read the book.

Basically, the handmaids are assigned to powerful men called Commanders. They get no choice in the matter and have no ability to say no.

As part of the deal they lose their real names and have to be called "of" [commander's name].

The lead character (played by Elisabeth Moss, who won a well-deserved Emmy for the role last year, and whom you may remember from Mad Men or West Wing) is assigned to a man named Fred.

So she is required to be addressed by the name Offred (Of Fred). One of the other main characters is called "Ofwarren" because she has been assigned to a Commander named Warren. See how it works? And if you get assigned to a different Commander for some reason then you take his name. In the TV series, for example, Ofwarren is sent to a man named Daniel and then she has to be called Ofdaniel. So drawing DJT as a Handmaid and naming him Ofputin is an insult on several levels:

- it is depicting DJT as female, which he will hate
- it means DJT is completely under Putin's thumb and has to be submissive to Putin in every way
- it means DJT has no choice but to obey any order Putin might give, even an order that would involve breaking official laws
- it means DJT has no autonomy whatsoever, no ability to make any decisions on his own without the threat of punishment; and
- it also means DJT is stuck in this subservient relationship and has no possibility of escape.

I will touch only briefly on the sexual angle because I'm not a fan of people who sexualize the relationship between Putin and DJT, but it is part of this meme so I have to acknowledge it here.

Handmaids are required to have a ritualized sex ceremony with the Commanders. This happens in the presence of, and with the permission of, the Commanders' wives. (The whole point of Handmaids is that they are the last remaining fertile women and one of the perks of power in the culture is when the government assigns you a Handmaid. Only upper-class/privileged/well-connected men are allowed the chance to reproduce.)

Handmaids and Commanders are not supposed to have sex outside of the ceremony/without the Wife present, but if the Commander asks for it Handmaids are not allowed to say no to anything the Commander wants sexually.

I would rather focus on the obedience/lack of autonomy aspects of depicting DJT as Ofputin, since that's what came to my mind when I first saw the picture. Just the idea that Putin owns him and can tell him what to do and he is incapable of saying no. But the requirement to be sexually submissive is part of the meme and I know that could even come to mind first for a lot of people who watch the show. I suppose to take this analogy further, the Republicons in Congress would be the Wives. Damn now I am imagining Paul Ryan and Mitch McConnell in blue dresses and capes... [eww...shiver]

Anyway, that should explain to people who have never read the book or seen the Hulu series why Handmaid's Tale fans are raving about this protest sign.

And as a mini-bonus, Ofputin looks like the word "off-putting" which certainly describes DJT in more ways than one.

Margaret Atwell's 1985 novel is a dystopian feminist classic now. Very hard to read. The TV show is visualized in an even more harrowing way than I imagined it, which makes it *VERY* difficult to watch.

But it is brilliantly written and acted and full of powerful political commentary, so it is highly recommended.

This sign is brilliant and I hope it catches on just like the Trump Baby Blimp.

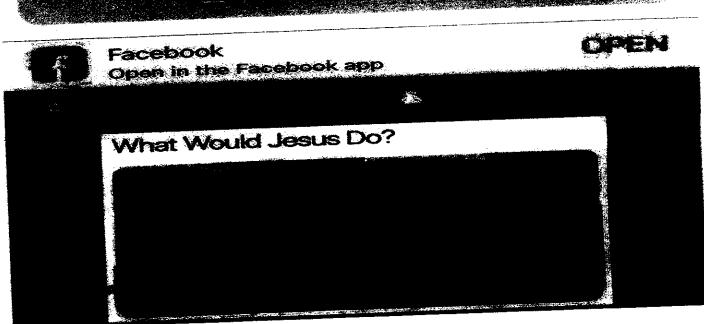

Motion to approve the Budget & Finance minutes December 4th, 2019 was made by Commissioner Waddle, seconded by Commissioner Quillen. Minutes carried.

BUDGET AMENDMENTS:

For their review, the Committee received budget requests that had already been previously approved by Mayor Morrison.

Chancery Court Kay Solomon Armstrong requested that in the department of the Chancery Court, that \$4,750 be transferred from Clerical Personnel (162), into Part-time Personnel (169). This amendment is needed for Part-time Personnel while full time is on leave. Commissioner Burkey made a motion to approve the Chancery Court Department request. It was seconded by Commissioner Waddle; all were in favor.

I. RESOLUTIONS:

A. A Resolution of the Greene County Legislative Body to appropriate \$52,944 to the Sheriff's Department for funds received from various sources for the FYE June 30, 2020. Motion to approve resolution A. was made by Commissioner Quillen and seconded by Commissioner Tucker. Motion passed.

- B. A resolution of the Greene County Legislative Body to appropriate \$80,000 to the Greene County Solid Waste Fund 116, to purchase equipment for FYE June 30, 2020. Motion to approve resolution B. was made by Commissioner Tucker, and seconded by Commissioner Quillen. Motion passed.
- C. A Resolution to amend the Greene County Schools General Purpose School Fund 141 budget to reflect \$158,532 changes in revenue and expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. A motion to approve resolution C was made by Commissioner Tucker. seconded by Commissioner Waddle. Motion passed.
- D. A Resolution to amend the Greene County Schools Capital Projects Fund 177 budget \$273,195; a diesel settlement disposing of six diesel buses and replacing them with six propane buses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. Been working with City Police Dept, plan is to have a fueling station at the Vocational School for the buses and the City Police department can use with theirs. Motion to approve resolution D. was made by Commissioner Burkey and seconded by Commissioner Quillen. Motion passed.

DISCUSSIONS:

Commissioner Waddle said he was going to summit a resolution as a class action lawsuit to the State for the more equitable division of Sales Tax. He wants to make sure that the Mayor and the County Attorney are on line with this. The City gets the majority of the sales tax. Mr. Waddle wants to sponsor the resolution. Commissioner Tucker stated that the distribution was outdated and it is not equitable and has not been a fair system for years. Other Counties feels that it is unfair. David McClain, director of Greene County Schools stated that BEP was set up on the ability to pay. Greene County has two school districts. Within that formula, Greeneville City is included, which makes Greene County look much wealthier. Mr. McClain recommends that they would revamp and look at that formula without including Greeneville City choosing to have a school system. If that was omitted, the formula would not be showing we are as wealthy. It needs to be drastically looked at. Commissioner Waddle feels that once the sales tax resolution is in place, other Counties will get involved. Mayor Morrison said he will see County Attorney Roger Woolsey and get a resolution researched. No action was needed.

ADJOURNMENT:

Motion to adjourn was made by Commissioner Burkey, seconded by Commissioner Tucker. Meeting Adjourned at 1:59 P.M.

The Greene County Commission Education Committee met at 3:30 PM at the Greene County Schools Central Office for its regular December meeting.

The Committee reviewed the minutes from the 2 December meeting. Mr. Bowers made the motion to approve the minutes. Mr. Dabbs seconded. Motion to approve passed 4-0.

Mr. McLain presented a School Board-approved resolution for consideration by the County Commission to move \$158,532 from the School Fund Balance to the Building Improvements line for the purpose of renovating a building on the Mosheim campus to prepare a space for the Mosheim 5th grade once the Middle School expands to include middle school students from McDonald. Itemized costs are attached. Mr. Dabbs made the motion to approve, Mr. Bowers seconded the motion. Motion passed 4-0.

Mr. McLain presented a School Board-approved resolution for consideration by the County Commission to approve the appropriations of \$273,195 from the VW Diesel Settlement Environmental Mitigation Trust School Bus Replacement Grant to the Transpiration Equipment funding line to purchase diesel alternative buses. Mr. Bowers made the motion to approve, Mr. Dabbs seconded the motion. Motion passed 4-0.

Mr. McLain provided an update on the Sunnyside property. The facility has been demolished except for the gym, which will remain. The School Board will consider selling portions of the property in the future. The School Board will soon consider the future of West Pines as well.

Mr. Tipton provided an update on the energy infrastructure for the School System. He revisited the ages of the HVAC systems county-wide and reported that Schneider Electric had been hired to survey the energy infrastructure and propose a plan to upgrade with more efficient, comprehensive systems. Mr. McLain mentioned that any phased plan for upgrades will depend on how the County moves forward on the plan to build new schools.

The Greene County Emergency Communications District, Board of Directors, met on December 17, 2019, at 3:30pm, for a regular meeting, at the Rescue Squad Building, West Church Street, Greeneville, Tennessee. Chairman Tim Ward presided over the meeting.

Minutes from the Called Meeting on December 10, 2019, were presented by the Secretary Pamela Carpenter to the board. Upon motion by Hoot Bowers and a second by John Waddle, the minutes were approved.

Treasurer John Waddle presented the monthly treasurer's report. Upon motion by Josh Kesterson and a second by Pamela Carpenter, the treasurer's report was approved.

Calvin Hawkins was presented with a plaque for his service on the Greene County Emergency Communications District, Board of Directors.

Under Old Business, Neighbor Matthew McKeever Fence Installation, Mr. McKeever wants to install that attaches to the current fence owned by the District. The landscaping has been completed and looks good. County Attorney Roger Woolsey has prepared a

20 year lease that provides the District access to the property where the fence is to be installed, upon need. This lease will protect both Mr. McKeever's interests and the District's interests in the property. On motion by Josh Kesterson and seconded by John Waddle, the motion to accept the lease was approved with Pamela Carpenter voting no.

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Under Old Business, Progress of NCIC Dispatcher Training, Seth Spradlin is the Terminal Agency Coordinator for the District. Seth stated that the District is 75% ready for NCIC operations, policies and procedures have been written from scratch, the IT personnel have been fingerprinted. Director Bird stated that 2 part time and 1 full time dispatchers have been hired. Most dispatchers have had the NCIC training and the rest are set to attend training. There will need to be approximately \$1500.00 spent for software licensing to add the required amount of licenses for NCIC.

Under Old Business, Update on USDA Loan and Grant, The monthly payment on the USDA Loan will be \$7,269.00 each month and \$87,200.00 yearly. The USDA loan provides a substantial saving from the Motorola Loan that initially taken for the Motorola equipment purchased by the District.

Under New Business, Robin Quillen made a motion to recommend to the County Mayor to release funds authorized by the Greene County Legislative Body. John Waddle seconded the motion. Motion approved.

Under New Business, Director Bird stated that funds have been received from Tusculum, Moshiem has signed an agreement and Baileyton is to consider funds on December 18, 2019. On the Hyper-Reach System, U.S. Nitrogen has agreed to pay \$1,500.00, discussions were had as to how to reach out to other businesses to help with the Hyper-Reach Notification System. Some of the ideas were to reach out through the Greene County Foundation, Safety Councils, Industrial Partnerships. 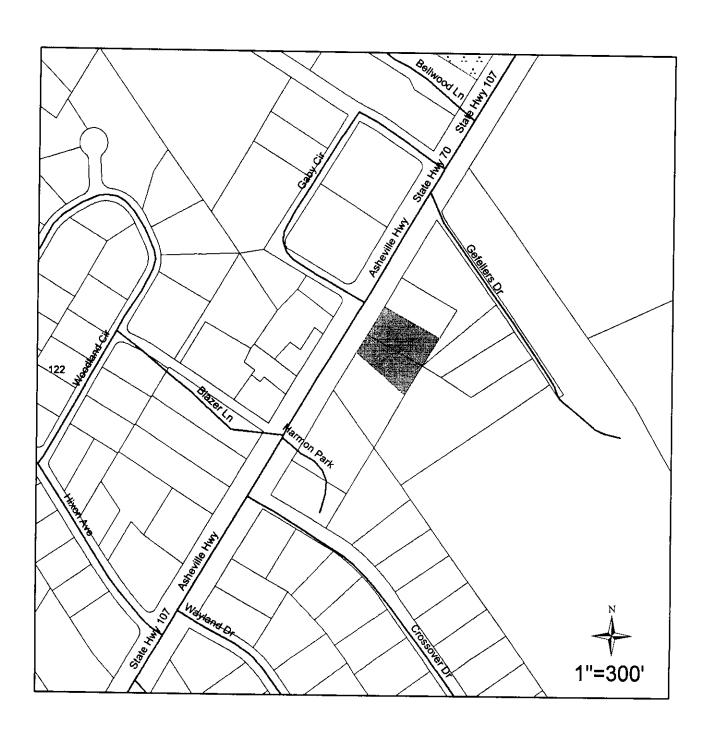

<u>Administrative approval</u>: Motion made, seconded and carried to recognize and concur with the following administrative approvals:

Tusculum Boulevard, preliminary & final plat for the Division of the Charles Ellenburg and Winnie Lou Doyle property. Administrative approval was granted to the preliminary and final plat of the Division of the Charles Ellenburg and Winnie Lou Doyle property located within the Town of Greeneville's corporate limits adjacent to Tusculum Boulevard, as identified on Greene County Tax Map 099A. Group A, Parcel 016.00. The plat involves a lot line revision between two parcels, totaling 2.44 acres. The resulting lots are Lot 1 (1.68 acres), which contains a two-story structure, and Lot 2 (0.76 acres), containing the Flowers by Tammy shop. The property is currently zoned B-4 (Arterial Business). The plat met all requirements of the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Greeneville. Staff recommended consent.

RESOLUTION B: A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE GREENE COUNTY ZONING RESOLUTION REGARDING MANUFACTURED/MOBILE HOMES IN GREENE COUNTY, TENNESSEE

A motion was made by Commissioner Crawford and seconded by Commissioner
White to approve a Resolution amending the Greene County Zoning Resolution regarding
manufactured/mobile homes in Greene County, Tennessee.

Tim Tweed, Greene County Building Official, explained to the Commissioners that the proposed revisions to Greene County zoning regulations for the moving, set-up and occupancy of manufactured and mobile homes. The primary changes are that all regulations are to be met before a certificate of occupancy will be issued and that a moving permit be obtained for the transport of a home. The certificate of occupancy requirement will address issues that have arisen in the past with people starting to live in a mobile or manufactured home prior to having all regulations met. He said it is difficult to address those issues after a home is occupied. Among items to be completed are the installation of underpinning for the home for decking. Commissioners told Tim Tweed they have received questions and concerns from citizens about wording in the regulations that call for new materials for decking or underpinning to be installed for a home. The wording requiring the new materials has been in the regulations for several years, but can be changed if the commission desires. He said, "In inspecting decking and underpinning, the Building Department looks at safety, but has not withheld approval due to construction with used materials."

Greene County Attorney Roger Woolsey said that the wording has not caused any past issues and it would be more complicated to include used materials due to defining what

would be considered acceptable.

Tim Tweed said that the regulations require that the decking and underpinning be installed by a manufacturer, dealer or mover. Those revisions reflect changes in state law that put more responsibility on the installer in the placement of a mobile home on a lot. The revisions will require a dealer or mover of a mobile home to obtain a permit for the moving of a mobile home to obtain a permit for the moving of a home within the county.

WHEREAS, the Greene County Commission adopted a zoning resolution which included provisions for establishing policies regarding the transportation and placement of manufactured/mobile homes within the unincorporated territory of Greene County, Tennessee and regulations for the use of property therein;

WHEREAS, the Greene County Commission realizes that any zoning plan must be changed from time to time to provide for the continued efficient and economic development of the County; and

WHEREAS, Greene County has continued to have issues with the transportation (the moving of), placement, setup, and occupancy of manufactured/mobile homes in the unincorporated territory of Greene County; and

WHEREAS, the Greene County Health and Safety Board proposed to the Greene County Planning Commission that the provisions of the Greene County Zoning Resolution as it relates to the placement and transportation of manufactured/ mobile homes be amended as outlined and specified below: and

WHEREAS, Public Notice requirements pursuant to T.C.A. § 13-7-105(b)(1) have been complied with:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Greene County Legislative Body, meeting in regular session. on the 18th of February, 2020, a quorum being present and a majority of the full county commission membership voting affirmatively to amend the Greene County Zoning Resolution as follows:

Section 510 through 510.3 to be amended as follows.

- <u>510.</u> Placement of Manufactured/Mobile Homes. It shall be the responsibility of each person or company doing business as a mobile home dealer or mover to insure that the requirements of the Greene County Zoning Resolution are met prior to placing a manufactured/mobile home on any lot in the unincorporated territory of Greene County or removing a manufactured/mobile home from any lot in the unincorporated territory of Greene County.
- 510.1 Each manufactured/mobile home dealer or mover shall obtain a building permit from the county building commissioner prior to placing a manufactured/mobile home on any lot in the unincorporated territory of Greene County and permit must be posted in home while in transit and remain in structure until Certificate of Occupancy is issued.
- 510.2 Each manufactured/mobile home dealer or mover shall underpin and construct decks on each manufactured/mobile home placed in a neat and attractive manner. 510.3 If a property owner or any other person desires to remove a manufacture/mobile home (new, used or salvage) from any property/parcel in the unincorporated territory of Greene County, either to transport said manufactured/mobile home to a new site or location in Greene County or to move the manufactured/mobile home to another county, state, or demolition yard (or for any other purpose). the manufactured/mobile home must be moved by a licensed mobile home mover or transport company. The manufactured/mobile home mover or transport company must, before hooking to the manufacture/mobile home, secure a moving permit from the office of the Greene County Building Official. There is no charge for the moving permit. The moving permit shall list the following:

1. Owner of the manufactured/mobile home and address where the manufactured/mobile home is presently situated.

2. The name, address, telephone number, and license number of the licensed mobile home mover or transport company.

3. An accurate description of the mobile home to be moved, including the make, model and year of manufacture, and VIN number as well as a reasonable description of the color, length and width of the manufactured/mobile home to be moved.

4. This moving certificate shall be attached to mobile home before it is moved and/or transported on any road, street or highway in Greene County, Tennessee.

510.4 Manufactured/mobiles homes notwithstanding their condition are not permitted to be used as an accessory structure for storage or otherwise in the unincorporated territory of Greene County.

WHEREAS, The Industrial Development Board of the Town of Greeneville and Greene County, Tennessee (the "IDB") has prepared an economic impact plan (the "Economic Impact Plan") regarding the development of an area located at 2645 E. Andrew Johnson Highway in Greeneville, Greene County, Tennessee (the "Plan Area");

WHEREAS, the Developer of the Plan Area is expected to develop a Chick-fil-A restaurant at that location (the "Project");

WHEREAS, the Economic Impact Plan would permit certain tax increment financing ("Tax Increment Financing") to be provided through the issuance of the IDB's bonds, notes and other obligations in the total amount not to exceed \$200,000.00 pursuant to Chapter 53, Title 7 of the Tennessee Code Annotated; and

WHEREAS, the IDB has recommended the adoption of the Economic Impact Plan at its meeting on February 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the proceeds of the Tax Increment Financing would be used to pay the costs of eligible public improvements (the "TIF Eligible Costs") relating to the development of the Project; and

WHEREAS, the incremental property tax revenues (the "TIF Revenues") that result from the development of the Plan Area under the Economic Impact Plan will be allocated to the IDB to be used to pay debt service on the obligations expected to be issued by the Board to pay the costs of the public improvements described in the Economic Impact Plan; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Economic Impact Plan, the IDB would issue the Tax Increment Financing to a lender or lenders to finance the TIF Eligible Costs and would pledge the TIF Revenues to such lender or lenders to apply to the debt service on the Tax Increment Financing; and

WHEREAS, the Tax Increment Financing shall not represent or constitute a debt or pledge of the faith and credit or the taxing power of the IDB, the Town of Greeneville, or Greene County, Tennessee: and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the IDB has approved and submitted the Economic Impact Plan (attached as Exhibit A to this Resolution) to the County Commission of Greene County, Tennessee for approval in accordance with Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-53-312.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Greene County Commission, (the "County Commission"), meeting in regular session on the 18th day of February, 2020 a quorum being present and a majority voting in the affirmative to approve the Economic Impact Plan and certain tax increment financing, in as provided in the Plan as shown in <u>Exhibit A</u>, (attached to this Resolution), said Plan being in the interests of the citizens of Greene County, Tennessee.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT BOARD OF THE TOWN OF GREENEVILLE AND GREENE COUNTY, TENNESSEE

FOR CROCKETT CROSSING DEVELOPMENT AREA

I. Authority for Economic Impact Plan

Industrial development corporations ("IDBs") are authorized under Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-53-312 to prepare and submit to cities and counties an economic impact plan with respect to an area that includes a project within the meaning of Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-53-101 and such other properties that the IDB determines will be directly improved or benefited due to the undertaking of a project. Tennessee Code Annotated § 7-53-312 also authorizes cities and counties to apply and pledge new incremental tax revenues, which arise from the area subject to the economic impact plan, to the IDB to promote economic development, to pay the cost of projects or to pay debt service on bonds or other obligations issued by the IDB to pay the costs of projects.

II. The Project

New Urban Development Corporation, LLC, an affiliate thereof or an assignee approved by the Board (collectively, the "Developer") has proposed to purchase certain tracts of real property located at 2645 E. Andrew Johnson Highway in Greeneville, Greene County, Tennessee in the Crockett Crossing development. Such property consists of approximately 2.147 acres and is ideally situated for commercial development. The Developer has proposed to develop an Chick-fil-A restaurant on the property, which is a restaurant brand not currently located in the Town. This development will be in an area designated by the Developer as Crockett Crossing, and such commercial retail development is collectively referred to herein as the "Project." The Project is an eligible project within the meaning of Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-53-101(13).

In order to make the Project financially feasible, Developer has requested that Greene County, Tennessee (the "County") and the Town of Greeneville, Tennessee (the "Town") approve, as part of this Economic Impact Plan, a plan for tax increment financing through The Industrial Development Board of the Town of Greeneville and Greene County, Tennessee (the "Board") pursuant to Title 7, Chapter 53 of Tennessee Code Annotated to provide funds to pay a portion of the costs of the improvements that are needed to permit the construction and operation of the Project. The proceeds of the tax increment financing would be used to pay eligible costs, in accordance with the Tax Increment Act (as defined below), relating to the Project.

III. Boundaries of Plan Area

The Project is generally located at 2645 E. Andrew Johnson Highway in the Crockett Crossing development within the Town and the County. The area that would be subject to this Economic Impact Plan, and to the tax increment financing provisions described below, includes only the property on which the Project will be located. The area that will be subject to this plan (the "Plan Area") is shown on Exhibit A attached hereto. A list of the parcels included in the Plan Area is also attached as part of Exhibit A. The Plan Area is hereby declared to be subject to this Economic Impact Plan, and the Project is hereby identified as the project that will be located within the Plan Area.

IV. Financial Assistance to Project

The Board will provide financial assistance to the Project by applying the proceeds of the tax increment financing described herein to pay a portion of certain costs that will be incurred in connection with the development of the Project. These costs include [traffic improvements, parking areas, road improvements, storm water drainage system improvements] and any costs for which the Board receives a written determination from the Comptroller of the State of Tennessee (the "State") and the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development of the State as described below. The Board will pay and/or reimburse the Developer for all or a portion of the eligible cost of such improvements upon receipt of adequate documentation of such costs. In connection with the issuance of any tax increment financing, the Board and the Developer will enter into a development agreement specifying the scope and the cost of the improvements and fees to be reimbursed.

Tenn. Code Ann. § 9-23-108 does not permit the application of incremental tax revenues pursuant to this Economic Impact Plan to pay certain costs relating to privately-owned land without first receiving a written determination from the Comptroller of the State and the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development of the State that the use of tax increment revenues for such purposes is in the best interest of the State. The Board will not apply the proceeds of the tax increment financing authorized hereunder to pay costs as to which such a written determination is required without first obtaining such written determination.

V. Expected Benefits to City and County

Numerous benefits will accrue to the Town and the County as a result of the development of the Plan Area. The development of retail establishments, such as the Project, will assist the Town and the Board in promoting economic development. When companies select locations for manufacturing, distribution and office facilities, a significant factor that is considered by site selection firms is the quality of life for the companies' employees in each community being considered as a possible location. By providing a wider array of restaurant choices in the Town, including additional nationally recognized retailers, the Project will assist the Town and the Board with economic development recruiting and help expand the economic base of the Town and County.

Both the Town and the County are also expected to receive substantial additional taxes as a result of the development of the Plan Area. The ad valorem real property taxes for the Plan Area for the year 2019 were \$15,610 for the Town and the County combined, which are the base taxes relating to the Plan Area. Development of the Plan Area will increase the value of the real property within the Plan Area, leading to an increase in ad valorem real property taxes. Following the reappraisal of the Project after construction is completed, the combined annual real property taxes payable to the Town and the County are expected to be approximately \$50,972. Of this total, the base taxes described above plus approximately \$2,826 in taxes that are allocable to paying debt service on the Town's and the County's general obligation debt will be allocated to the Town and the County. These additional taxes will immediately benefit the Town and the County. Once the tax increment financing described below is paid, the remaining incremental property tax revenues will be payable to the Town and the County, and the Town and the County will benefit from those incremental taxes at that point and for years to come. The Town and the County will also benefit from additional personal property taxes to the extent not allocated to pay debt service on the tax increment financing described below.

Furthermore, the Town and the County are expected to receive substantial additional sales tax revenues as a result of the development of the Project. When the restaurant operations are at full projected sales volumes, the annual local sales tax revenue generated is projected to be \$110,000. Additionally, the restaurant operations are expected to support a total of 120 direct and indirect jobs.

VI. Distribution of Property Taxes and Tax Increment Financing

- a. <u>Distribution of Taxes</u>. Property taxes, including personal property taxes, imposed on the property located within the Plan Area shall be allocated and distributed as provided in this subsection. The taxes assessed by the County and the Town on the real and personal property within the Plan Area will be divided and distributed as follows in accordance with Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-53-312(c) and Title 9, Chapter 23 of the Tennessee Code Annotated, being the Uniformity in Tax Increment Financing Act of 2012 (the "Tax Increment Act"):
 - i. The portion of the real and personal property taxes payable with respect to the Plan Area equal to the year prior to the date of approval of this Economic Impact Plan (the "Base Tax Amount") shall be allocated to and, as collected, paid to the County and the Town as all other taxes levied by the County and the Town on all other properties; provided, however, that in any year in which the taxes on the property within the Plan Area are less than the Base Tax Amount, there shall be allocated and paid to the County and the Town only the taxes actually imposed.
 - ii. An amount equal to the lesser of (a) 80% of (x) all ad valorem property taxes assessed annually in respect of the Plan Area, less (y) the Base Tax Amount, and (b) all ad valorem property taxes assessed annually in respect of the Plan Area, less (x) the Base Tax Amount, less (y) any portion of such incremental tax revenues designated by the Town and the County to pay debt service on the Town's and County's obligations that is required to be excluded from the TIF Revenues pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. 7-53-312 and the Tax Increment Act (the "TIF Revenues") shall be allocated and, as collected, paid

into a separate fund of the Board, created to hold such payments until the tax proceeds in the fund are to be applied to pay debt service on the obligations expected to be issued by the Board that are described to pay the costs of the public improvements described above.

This allocation is subject to the provisions of Tenn. Code Ann. §7-53-312(j) and Tax Increment Act, which requires that taxes levied upon property within the Plan Area for the payment of debt service of the County and the Town shall not be allocated to the Board. The Board is authorized to make all calculations of TIF Revenues on the basis of each parcel within in the Plan Area instead of on an aggregate basis as permitted by the Tax Increment Act. If the Board opts to have such calculations made based upon each parcel, the Board shall give notice to the Town and the County that such methodology will be used prior to the first allocation date of any TIF Revenues.

The Board is also authorized to designate, by notice to the Town and the County, that the allocation of TIF Revenues from any parcel or group of parcels in the Plan Area shall begin in any tax year within the next three tax years in order to match TIF Revenues with the application of TIF Revenues for the purposes provided herein, subject to the time limitation on allocations provided below. Allocations of TIF Revenues by the Town and the County shall be made within the time periods provided within the Tax Increment Act but, in any event, not later than sixty days from when such TIF Revenues are collected by the Town or the County.

- b. <u>TIF Obligations</u>. In order to pay for the costs of the public improvements needed for the Project, the Board intends to use the incremental tax revenues that it would receive as a result of the adoption of the Economic Impact Plan to pay debt service on obligations incurred to finance such costs. This tax increment financing will be structured as follows:
 - i. The Board will borrow not to exceed \$200,000 through the issuance and sale of notes, bonds or other obligations of the Board. The Board shall pledge any and all TIF Revenues allocated to the Board pursuant to this Economic Impact Plan to the payment of such notes, bonds or other obligations, including, without limitation, principal and interest thereon. In no event will the obligations issued by the Board be considered a debt or obligation of the County or the Town in any manner whatsoever, and the source of the funds to satisfy the Board's payment obligations thereunder shall be limited solely to the TIF Revenues and are otherwise non-recourse to the Board.
 - ii. The proceeds of the notes, bonds or obligations shall be used to pay eligible costs relating to the Project as described above, costs of issuances relating to notes, bonds or obligations and capitalized interest on the notes, bonds or other obligations for a maximum period of two (2) years from the date of completion of the Project.
- c. <u>Time Period</u>. Taxes on the real and personal property within the Plan Area will be divided and distributed as provided in this Section of the Economic Impact Plan for a period, as to each parcel in the Plan Area, not in excess of ten (10) tax years as to any parcel, but, in any event, such allocations shall cease when there are not eligible costs, including debt service, to be paid from the TIF Revenues.

d. <u>Finding of Economic Benefit</u>. The Board, the County and the Town, by the adoption of this Plan, find that the use of the TIF Revenues as described herein, is in furtherance of promoting economic development in the Town and County.

VII. Approval Process

Pursuant to Tenn. Code Ann. § 7-53-312, the process for the approval of this Economic Impact Plan is as follows:

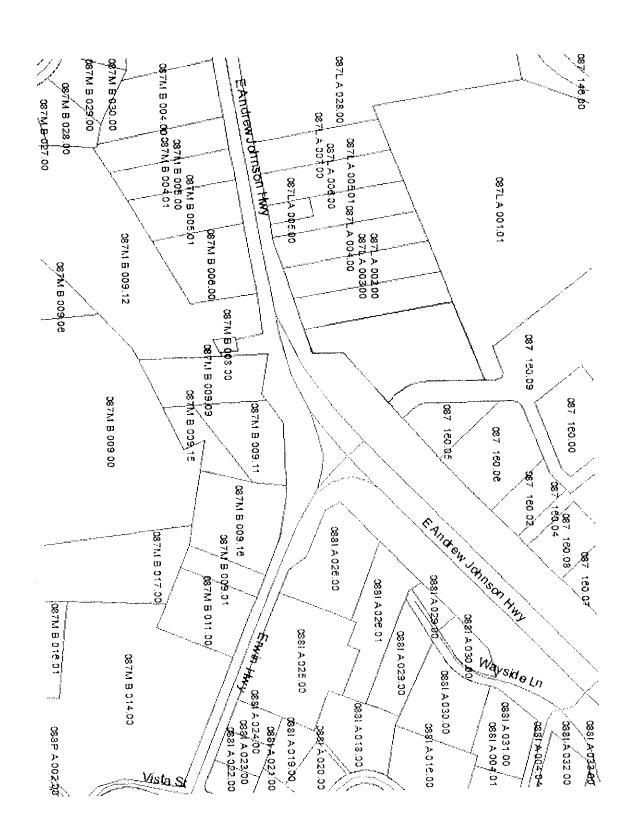
- a. The Board holds a public hearing relating to the proposed Economic Impact Plan after publishing notice of such hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in the County and the Town at least two (2) weeks prior to the date of the public hearing. The notice must include the time, place and purpose of the hearing as well as notice of how a map of the subject area may be viewed by the public. Following such public hearing, the Board may submit the Economic Impact Plan to the County and the Town for their approval.
- b. The governing bodies of the County and the Town must approve the Economic Impact Plan. The Economic Impact Plan may be approved by resolution of the County Commission or the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, whether or not the local charter provisions of the governing bodies provide otherwise. If either the County or the Town make any changes to this Economic Impact Plan in connection with their approval hereof, such changes must be approved by the Board and the governing body of the Town or County that did not make such change.
- c. Once the Economic Impact Plan has been approved by the governing bodies of the County and the Town, the Plan and related documentation shall be filed with the local taxing officials and the Comptroller of the State as required by the Tax Increment Act and annual statements of incremental tax revenues allocated to the Board shall be filed with the State Board of Equalization as required by the Tax Increment Act. The Board will also comply with all other procedural requirements of the Tax Increment Act and other applicable laws.

RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS THAT WAS PREVIOUSLY ADOPTED ON SEPTEMBER 19, 2011 AND AMENDED ON OCTOBER 15, 2012 and SEPTEMBER 17, 2018

WHEREAS, the Greene County Board of Commissioners by resolution passed and approved Rules of Procedure to be followed by the Board in the transaction of County business on September 19, 2011 which rules were subsequently amended on October 15, 2012 and September 17, 2018; and

WHEREAS, presently, all resolutions requiring action by the Greene County Legislative Body must be introduced/sponsored by any member of the Legislative body and/or by a duly formed Committee of County Government, and upon its introduction by appropriate motion and second shall be considered at one reading for final passage by the vote of the Board; and

WHEREAS, however, it would appear that in order to provide additional time for reconsideration by commissioners and increase notice and information to citizens, resolutions to implement, change, and/or modify a policy, regulation, or ordinance of county government concerning the regulation, licensing, or taxing of pets as well as resolutions to add, remove, or change the length or speed limit of roads on the official county road list should require two readings for final passage of the legislation; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish those goals, the Rules of Procedure, Section 7 should be amended by adding a new Subsection 7E and designating previous Subsection "7E" as Subsection "7F" as follows:

7E. RESOLUTIONS REQUIRING TWO READINGS: All proposed resolutions to implement, change, and/or modify a policy or ordinance of county government concerning the regulation, licensing, taxing of pets as well as resolutions to add, remove, or change the length or speed limits of roads on the official county road list shall require two readings for final passage.

Upon the resolution's introduction, each ordinance, regulation, or policy concerning the regulation, licensing, taxing of pets as well as resolutions to add, remove, or change the length of or speed limits of roads shall be put upon its first reading, whereupon the presiding officer shall first open it up for discussion by the Legislative Body. After terminating the discussion as provided herein, the ordinance or policy may be:

- 1) Amended by appropriate motion, second and majority vote (two-thirds if statutorily required) of the Legislative Body; and then
- 2) Advanced to a second reading by appropriate motion, second and majority vote (two-thirds if statutorily required) of the Legislative Body at the next regular scheduled meeting before an ordinance or regulation as above described shall be implemented; and
